There is a major crisis in Australia that no-one wants to talk about and policymakers continue to ignore. Victim-survivors of domestic and family violence cannot access safe and secure housing and services. We spoke to victim-survivors to learn more about the problem, its impacts, what they need and how we can fix this crisis. This is what they told us...

On average one Australian Woman is killed every week by their intimate partner.

THE IMPACTS

HEALTH SYSTEM

Women who are homeless due to domestic violence (DV) are at greater risk of sexual assault and physical abuse
(Australian Human Rights Commission, 2008)

NDIS

Despite widely reported higher risk of violence for women with disabilities they have the poorest access to services when dealing with violence.

NDIS is explicit, it is not a housing provider.

EDUCATION

DV results in poor academic performance, problem-solving and social skills and disruptive behaviour in children (Lloyd, 2018) and higher dropout rates (Victorian Auditor General, 2012)

HOMELESSNESS SERVICES

42% of women and their children accessed homelessness services in 2020-21 because of DV (AHURI, 2021)

3 out of 5 were returning clients (AHURI, 2021)

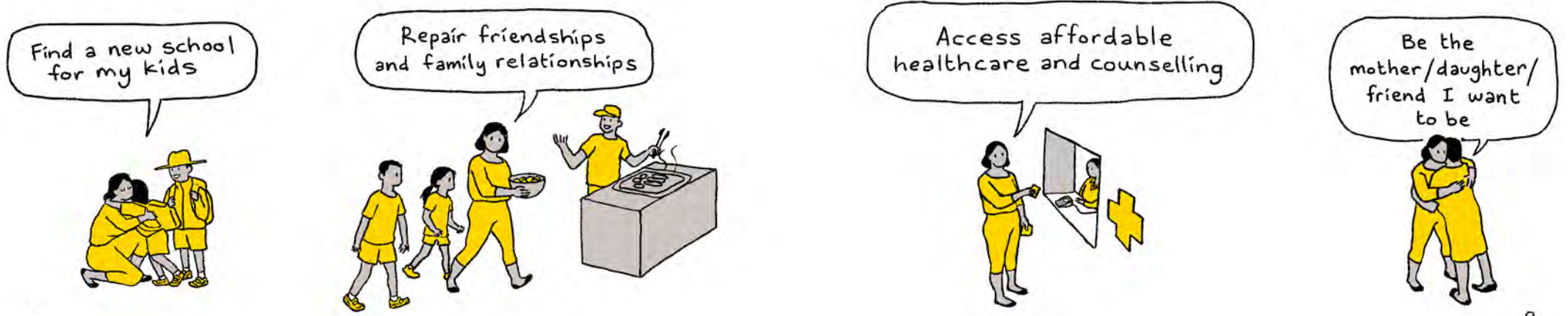
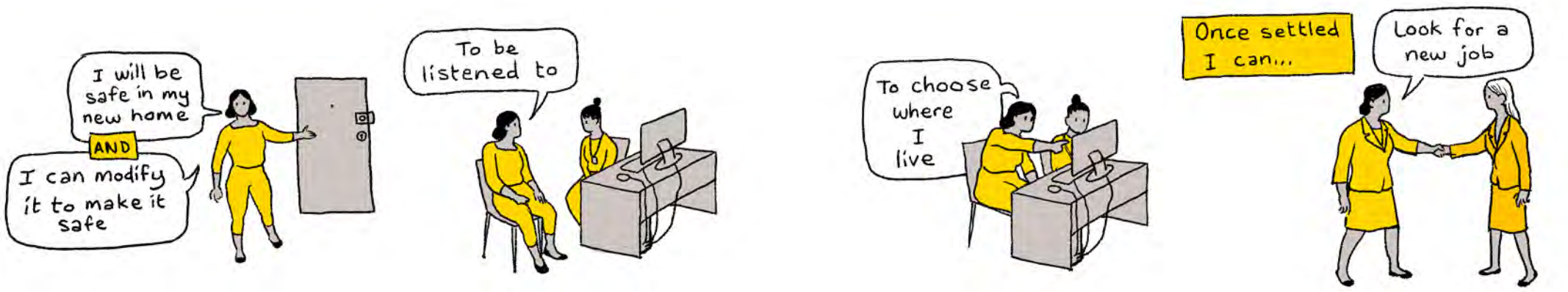
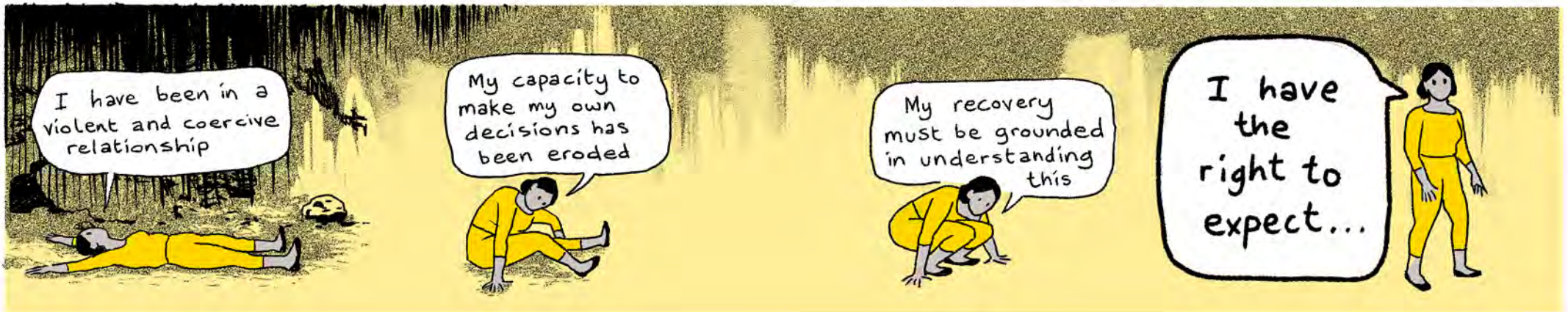
CHILD PROTECTION SERVICES

There is a disconnect between Housing, Centrelink, and Child Protection Services. For example many mothers lose custody of their children simply because they have nowhere safe and stable to stay (AHURI, 2019)

THE JUSTICE SYSTEM

DV can lead to offending and criminal behaviour. As at June 2018, between 70 and 90% of incarcerated Australian women experienced DV (ABS, 2018)



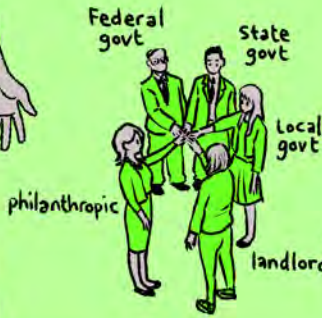


What can policy makers and service providers do to ensure my safety?

We can offer you a long term lease based on your current income that can easily be adjusted in the future.

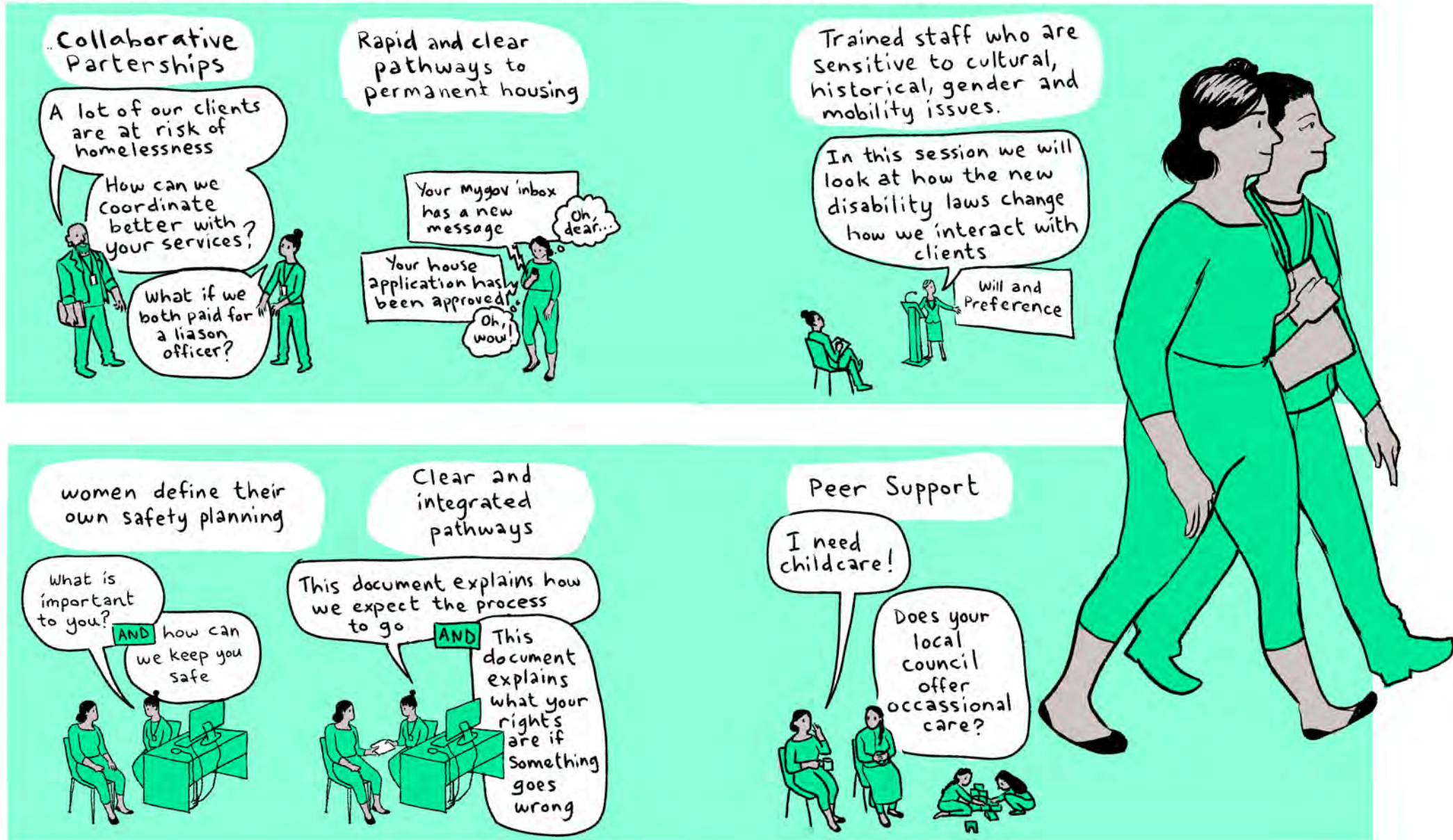


There is a great school for your son and public transport is close by
